On September 14th I was formally installed as the pastor of Mihama Grace Christ Church. For longer than I have been alive, Mihama Grace had been without its own pastor. Planted by Converge's first missionary to Japan, Francis Sorley, it had been without a pastor since his retirement in the 1970's. A small group of believers stubbornly kept the doors of their church open for over forty years with the cooperation of pastors from as far as two hours away.

Please continue to pray for a fresh move of the Spirit among the Japanese peoplethat despite the many obstacles to the Gospel, many would hear and respond and put their faith in Jesus.

Please pray for the Japanese people, most of whom have never had a chance to hear the Gospel. Pray that God having 5 to 15 members, and many of the area pastors have exceeded retirement age. We are looking at a looming crisis in which the very small beachhead that the Gospel has among the people of Wakayama is increasingly shrinking. Please pray that God would send more missionaries and Japanese partners to work with us to help disciple and reach Wakayama for Jesus.

Even though I am serving as a pastor, I will not be taking a salary of any kind from the church and we still depend on the generous support of Christians from outside of Japan to do the ministry we do here. It isn't our desire to take any ongoing financial support from the church in Mihama, but instead, to help move it towards a place where it could call and support a Japanese pastor. In order to do this, we're going to be reinvesting church funds into updating the facility and eventually hopefully being able to provide a guest house for visiting missionaries and a parsonage for a Japanese partner.

We have continued to open our home to share Christ's love with those around us. Recently we had a couple of friends visit from Hiroshima.

Shou (a young Japanese pastor) and his wife Kana came to stay with us for a few days, and Hiroshi and Yukiko came to join us for a day of fellowship. In a couple of weeks we're having K-san, a firefighter from Shirahama and his family over for BBQ, the last time we met I had the opportunity to share a very in-depth Gospel presentation with him. Please pray that God would continue to work in his heart and draw him to faith in Jesus Christ. We're also hoping to develop a closer relationship with our neighbors; please pray that God would open doors for us to share his love with those in our neighborhood.
